Do all of your tractors have a ROPS?

Tractor rollovers are a leading cause of injuries and fatalities. Using a tractor without a Rollover Protective System (ROPS) puts you at high risk for serious injury or death. When used with a seatbelt, ROPS nearly eliminates the risk of a fatality in a tractor rollover. Almost any tractor can be retrofitted with a ROPS and you may be eligible for a rebate.

Do your stairs and ladders have appropriate fall protection?

Falls from height are the leading cause of occupational deaths. Like all work sites, farms have numerous fall risks. To reduce your risk of a serious fall, make sure all stairs have appropriate rails and guards, enclose bin ladders, and exit equipment backwards, keeping three points of contact on the ladder at all times.

Do you have the right chemical resistant gloves?

Pesticide labels may require waterproof and/or chemicalresistant gloves. The label lists the chemical-resistant materials that can be used with the product. No glove material will protect you from all pesticides, so check the pesticide label to determine if a specific glove type is required.

Do you know the hazards of needlesticks?

More than 80% of agricultural workers report having experienced a needlestick during routine animal care. These are usually minor, but can be serious. A few simple precautions can help keep you safe: don't re-cap needles, don't put syringes in your pocket, and use a sharps container to discard used needles.

Do you keep your helmet with your Off-Road Vehicle?

Over 60% of all Off-Road Vehicle (ORV) fatalities occur on roadways. ORVs have a high center of gravity, tires unsuited for roadway surfaces, and a locked rear differential that requires wider, slower turns. Only use ORVs on roadways when absolutely necessary for agricultural use and always wear a helmet and, if applicable, a seatbelt.

Do you have Lock Out Tag Out procedures for your grain bins?

Working in a grain bin with running equipment significantly increases the likelihood of a fatality. Any farm can implement Lock Out Tag Out (LOTO) procedures. Prior to entering, de-energize all equipment and lock the control box (lock out). Attach a warning tag to the controls (tag out) to ensure no one re-starts equipment until all workers are clear.

Do you maintain good ventilation in your silo rooms?

Dry conditions can increase nitrates in silage material, putting you at risk for exposure to deadly silo gases. Stay out of upright silos for at least three weeks after filling and maintain good ventilation in the silo room. Consider where gases may drift from horizontal silos and use caution when opening, especially within three weeks of filling.

Have you checked the lighting and marking on your equipment?

More than 1100 roadway crashes involving agricultural equipment occur in the Midwest every year. Follow lighting and marking guidelines set by the American Society of Agricultural and Biological Engineers including keeping the Slow Moving Vehicle (SMV) emblem clean and visible, installing flashing lights, and using reflective tape.

Do you operate gas or LP fueled equipment indoors?

Carbon monoxide poisoning causes 35 deaths and 300 hospitalizations in Iowa each year. Power washing indoor areas, such as livestock barns, can cause exposure to carbon monoxide. Ensure good ventilation when running any gas or LP fueled equipment in a building; leave the space immediately if you experience headache, shortness of breath, dizziness, or nausea.

Do you know the signs of hypothermia and frost bite?

Moving snow is a common winter task that should be approached with safety in mind. Shorter daylight hours mean you may have to work in low-visibility conditions when slopes, obstacles, or debris hidden under the snow are difficult to detect. Be aware of weather conditions and know the signs of hypothermia and frost bite.
